## **The Building of the Church**

Recently, I heard someone being upset with the town council about not making their facilities available to community projects. I can understand this as a town council is supposed to serve the community, right? Yes, the criticism might be justified on the grounds that purpose for public facilities are not realized. I'm sure there are reasons for a council's stance - reasons that might be relevant or not.

It is ironic that Christians would criticize a town council for not making buildings available for the community

to use and yet the use of church buildings remain exclusive to religious activities. Just think about this for a moment - the town of Durham has at least five church buildings that are mainly unused for most of a typical week while there are initiatives in our community that are struggling to find spaces to utilize.

Some would say that a church sanctuary is a holy space that should not be violated by worldly activities. Kind of an Old Testament understanding of the temple. Yet, in the early New Testament times of the church, the spaces where Christians gathered were homes and strangers were welcomed with open arms.

We should remind ourselves that what we have in a church building is a gift from God. It is God's building, given by God to us with the purpose



determined by God. It is not just for the benefit of the members and the congregation. We can do good in being open to opportunities where we could be part of God's work in our community, through being more open and welcoming. Can we really afford not to be part of the work God is doing in our community?

Of course we have the responsibility of taking care and maintaining the gift that God has provided, but we must not allow ourselves to become selfish and exclusive when it comes to our church building. What makes a church building holy is the way it is making the coming of God's kingdom a reality.
